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
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Times of Church Services

Letter from the Manse

It has been an amazing winter weather wise although I worry that, because we have had such a quiet winter, we won't see a good summer. I have no reason or experience or skills for saying this but it always seems that there is cause and effect. As I get to older middle age (still not old as such- at least in my mind!) I seem to spend more time reflecting upon how things were. When I was a lad.... then there follows some rose tinted view of the world.... the winters were always colder and the summers warmer, you never locked your door at night because you trusted people and so on. It's probably nonsense but it makes you feel good looking back to the way things have been or at least as you perceived them to be. On the last Sunday in March (Mothering Sunday) I read out an excerpt from a statistical account of 1794 written by one of my predecessors in which he notes that 500 people in the parish took communion that year. He described his parish as industrious, sober and decent. I suspect not all were, and not all who took communion were, but we can but hope. I now have the pleasure of looking back over 25 years of ministry in Cluny and I have seen many changes. The old guard who ran the church when I arrived have almost all gone to higher service with a few notable exceptions who still work exceptionally well for the church along with new elders, board members and church members present in worship. We can look back with fond memories but we must look forward to what will be a time of change and challenge in the next few years. Our relationship with Monymusk Church continues strongly which is encouraging as the future of the Church of Scotland is for neighbouring congregations, presbyteries and denominations to work together more closely to share resources and to project a united front rather than defend old territories and practices of religion. The one thing that should bind us together is our knowledge of and love for Jesus Christ and our acceptance that he is head of the church and saviour of the world.

In my time here I have found out that there has always been a core of hard working diligent folk who do so much for this church and parish. Throughout the years at Cluny there have been changes of personnel but the ethos of service and support still carries on. Evidence of this is shown in many ways, not least when we come together for fund raising events, social events or special church services. I want to thank all those who have helped me in these 25 years and encourage you to pray for the church, for your elder, minister and neighbour.






Property Matters

Christmas Services

At a recent meeting of the Kirk Session one of the items on the agenda was the Christmas Services. Mr Glen thanked everyone who was involved in these and was delighted with the packed churches at the Candlelight Service in Cluny Church on Friday 16th December and the Christmas Eve service at 7pm in Monymusk Church. However he expressed concern about the low attendance at the traditional Watchnight Service at 11.30pm in Cluny Church. Numbers attending this service have been falling over the years and there were only 15 people there last Christmas Eve. Discussion followed about this trend and the Kirk Session agreed to consult the members about the future of the Watchnight Service before taking any decisions. Elders will be asking the opinions of members in their districts when delivering the May communion invitations but it would be good to have the views of everyone living in the parish. Please let Mr Glen or the Editor (email addresses are on the front cover of the newsletter) know what you think e.g. should the Watchnight Service continue or perhaps be held earlier in the evening? You may have other suggestions. All responses will be considered at the next meeting of the Kirk Session in October before any final decision is made.

What is Pentecost?

Pentecost (or Whitsunday) is when Christians celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit to the disciples of Jesus. It occurs seven weeks or 50 days after Easter. The disciples received the "gift of tongues" which is the ability to speak in other languages and they then spread the word of Jesus. This day is regarded as the birthday of the Christian Church. Symbols of Pentecost are those of the Holy Spirit: flames, wind, fire and a dove. The Holy Spirit forms the third part of the Trinity along with the Father and the Son. Pentecost will be celebrated at the service at Cluny Church on 4 June 2017 at 10am to which all are welcome.

The Bible is full of encouraging verses that give us hope and strength for every situation in which we may find ourselves.

Romans: Chapter 15, verse 13:

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Galatians: Chapter 5, verse 22:

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness.


Psalms: Chapter 23, verse 1:

The afternoon is very informal with half an hour of songs, a snack for the children then play and activity time with members of the team while Mums enjoy a cup of tea and cake and



Christchurch Cathedral, New Zealand


Christchurch Cathedral was built between 1864 and 1904, but the February 2011 Christchurch earthquake destroyed the spire and part of the tower and severely damaged the structure of the remaining building. The remainder of the tower was demolished in March 2012. The west wall suffered collapses in the subsequent earthquake in June 2011 and that is still the state the building is in 6 years on. In the picture below the steeple was on the right hand side.



There has been a considerable degree of controversy over what to do with the ruined building. The options are firstly to repair and rebuild the existing structure or secondly demolish and rebuild an earthquake proofed cathedral in a similar style or finally to demolish and build a modern cathedral for a soon to be modern city. Ironically each option is supported by a roughly a third of the


local population so whatever option is decided two thirds will be disappointed.


While the debate has been raging on, the congregation set about designing and building a new Transitional Cathedral which was to be a temporary structure. The new cathedral, because of its substantial use of cardboard in its construction, became known as the "Cardboard Cathedral". A-frame in style, rising 24 metres (79 feet), it would incorporate 86 cardboard tubes of 500 kilograms (1,100 lb) each atop 6 metre (20 feet) long shipping containers as the walls. This is the only cathedral in the world designed in this way. Even elements of the cathedral such as the altar, cross and font are made out of cardboard tubes. All this was achieved in just 11 months.



Is there much difference in the life of a small rural church like Cluny or a cathedral in a major city? Not really..... in times of trouble the congregation in Christchurch rallied round and gave not just their money to build the Transitional Cathedral but their time in making and preparing the cardboard tubes, painting the containers, etc. and still to this day acting as guides in the new cathedral. The giving of time by the congregation is a quality we see regularly in Cluny Church and is this year's stewardship theme.

The cardboard cathedral has subsequently been reinforced with steel posts going up through the cardboard tubes, to make it a permanent structure, so what is going to happen in the future when the original cathedral once more rises out of the rubble? There is immense pride and attachment in the congregation for the cardboard cathedral but can the church in Christchurch support both cathedrals financially and congregationally? Similarly will Cluny Monymusk churches both be sustainable 10 or 20 years down the line?





No matter the size of the church or its congregation they face the same issues, with the same strong support from their congregations, just on a different scale. But it is a blessing that we do not have earthquakes to deal with here.
